Health and Consumers



EUROBAROMETER survey - 2006

- 62% would change shopping habits in order to access more animal welfare friendly goods
- 51% think AW friendly goods are healthier than other food and 48% think they are of better quality
- 89% think that import should be produced under the same animal welfare conditions as those originating in the EU






Five freedoms (Brambell Committee 1965)

Freedom from hunger and thirst
Freedom from physical distress
Freedom from pain, injury and disease
Freedom from anxiety and fear
Freedom to carry out natural behaviour

Legal framework

Council Directive 93/119/EC

of 22 December 1993
On the protection of
animals at the time
of slaughter or Killing



COUNCIL REGULATION (EC) No 1099/2009 of 24 September 2009 on the protection of animals at the time of killing

COUNCIL REGULATION (EC) No 1099/2009 of 24 September 2009 on the protection of animals at the time of killing



Food, wool, skin, fur and fish!!!





Directive (EC) 93/119 Article 3 Reg.EC 1099/2009 Article 3

"Animals shall be spared any avoidable excitement pain or suffering during movement, lairaging, restraint, stunning, slaughter or killing"

(Reg. 1099/2009 ' related operations')





Art.3 Handling

- Animals are handled and housed taking in consideration their normal behaviour
- Animals are prevented from avoidable interaction with other animals that could harm their welfare





Art.4 and 5 Stunning

- regular checks
- Monitoring procedures are put in place according to Art.16

Art. 6 Standard operating procedures

FBO shall plan in advance the killing of animals and related operations and shall carry out in accordance with SOP







Art.7 Level and certificate of competence

FBO to ensure the following slaughter operations only carried out by persons holding a certificate of competence:

Mertificate

- -handling and care of animals before restraining
- -restrain
- -stunning
- -assessment of stunning
- -shackling or hoisting of live animals
- -bleeding of live animals
- -slaughtering





Art.8 Instructions for the use of restraining and stunning equipment


Restraining and stunning equipment shall be maintained and calibrated accordingly to the manufacturer's instructions. Those instructions to specify species, categories, quantities and/or weights of animals for which the equipment is entitled to be used.





Art. 9 Use of restraining and stunning equipment

- backup equipment available
- record of maintenance of equipment
- animals not restrained until the person is ready





Art. 12 Imports form third countries

Chapter II and III shall apply for the purpose of art.12 (2) (a) of Reg. 854/2004







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




Art. 14 Layout construction and equipment

Annex II Very detailed All the parameters to be considered in the approval:

- -throughput per hour
- -categories of animals and weight
- -capacity of the lariage







Art. 17 Animal Welfare Officer

- Responsible for Welfare
- Responsibilities to be described in SOP
- Certificated of competence issued for all operations
- Responsible of records of action taken to improve welfare





Art. 21 Certificate of competence

Certificate of competence approved by Designated Competent Authorities responsible for:

- -approving training programmes
- -content and modalities for examinations
- -delegation of final exams and issue of certificates of competence to approved external bodies (no conflict of interest)





Stunning killing permitted methods

Stunning

- -concussion
- -electro narcosis

Killing

- -free bullet (captive bolt)
- -electrocution
- -Gas
- -captive bolt





Species	Minimum current levels for head- only stunning
Cattle	1.28 amps
Calves (bovines of less than 6 month of age)	1.25 amps
Pigs	1.30 amps
Sheep and goats	1.0 amps
Chicken	240 mA
Turkey	400 mA












Film on Pigs slaughter
